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Recommendations

- **SKILLS**: Students engage in exploring Entrepreneurial topics and knowledge (i.e. Lean Canvas, Business Plan pitch competitions, Start it Up, World Series of Innovation)
- MINDSET: Students participate in learning or experiences to activate their entrepreneurial mindset, develop their transferable skills
- **NETWORK**: Build and utilize a diverse network of supporters, coaches, and mentors who can become advisors and future champions
- CERTIFICATIONS: ESB Certiport

Recommendations: From Laysa to Counselors!

Stimulating Entrepreneurship Throughout High School

•Encourage students to explore their interests and passions early on and consider how they can turn those into entrepreneurial opportunities. (e.g. starting a club, creating a volunteer opportunity, working with a startup or business to gain hands-on experience)

• Ask students what problems they currently face, regardless of how silly, and **encourage them to think creatively to innovate a solution**. Remember the ideas must be based on a problem!

• Encourage collaboration of students who are interested in entrepreneurship.

• **Provide access to resources** such as entrepreneurial programming, entrepreneurship clubs, competitions, and workshops to help students develop their skills and network with like-minded peers.

 Professionals love to get involved with students! Facilitate mentorship opportunities with local entrepreneurs or professionals in relevant industries to provide guidance and insights into the entrepreneurial journey. It's great to start building a network early.

Recommendations: From Laysa to Counselors!

Pathway for Continuing the Entrepreneurial Journey:

Helpful Questions to consider:

Does the student have a viable business opportunity? What stage are they in their entrepreneurial journey?

- Does the student have interests they'd like to explore?
- Consider the financial resources required: to finance a startup, participate in an incubator, or attend a university, or a technical school.

If the student's next steps are college:

•Look for colleges or universities with competitive entrepreneurship programs that offer courses, workshops, mentorship, and funding opportunities for student ventures.

•Consider the flexibility of the curriculum, alumni network, geographic region, internship opportunities, cost, and the support available for students to pursue their entrepreneurial interests alongside their academic studies.

• Tap into a student network and expand to speak to alumni and current students of different schools

If the student's next steps are other than college:

•Discuss how much time the student intends to devote to their venture.

•Search for incubators, accelerators, or venture studios that support aspiring entrepreneurs.

•Apply to experiential opportunities through internships or training programs (e.g. Workforce training opportunities, nonprofits, etc.)
